Next up in our series of interviews we have a winger who won the 1st Division Championship in 1989 but will forever be remembered for a certain goal during a certain cup tie in season 1987/88; Mark Smith. Jason Barber spoke to him for the magazine;

"I was one of the new full time guys that joined the club for the club's first Premier League campaign in 1987, it was a tricky time with so many of the guys that had come up through the leagues so guickly, with new boys like me coming in and getting matches ahead of them. I'd played against Dunfermline in my Queen's Park days in the Second Division just a few years before that, and the crowds they were getting even then were something else.

l was playing against guys like Norrie, Bobby Robertson, Bobby Forrest (who l'd be opposite as a

Queen's Park had a professional mindset within the amateur set up they had back then. but what a difference now with some money behind them, definitely going places. I was digging ditches working for British Steel as a labourer during the week and Sunday, then played for Queen's Park on a Saturday. I'd run from station to station all the time as rarely had a minute to spare, kept me fit if

nothing else.

I moved from Queen's Park to Celtic in 1986, when Rangers were making their big moves for England stars. I played a few games that season, when Davie Hay was the manager. As soon as Billy McNeill took over, he signed Joe Miller from Aberdeen for a big fee and I knew my chances were going to be very limited. I was only 23 at the time and wanted to play football.

I'd spoken to lain Munro who knew Tam Craig at Celtic, and I'd known Leish from when I'd been playing for Queen's Park in the second division days. Leish called me and I drove through straight away and signed that same day. You just know when the feeling is right and I was delighted to get the chance to play again. He sold the club to me and I was desperate to return the favour and put in some performances for him.

I played a few games and scored a couple of goals here and there. We played a match against Dundee United in the February and I got knocked spark out in a 50/50 head clash with Eamonn Bannon and got myself carried off. I was given the all clear for the next game, which turned out to be the big cup game against Rangers in front of 20,000 at East End. We'd trained up a the Old Course that week and we were practising



corners and crosses on what was a kid's play park. Winker was probably on the swings at the time, so it wasn't exactly drills being repeated over and over again. At least he was less of a danger at the play park, another time he nailed my new shoes to the floor and I fell for it, literally. I threw that ball into the box as I knew that Norrie or John would usually be chucking themselves up there to get it, so it was an early tester. Thankfully, it went straight in and I'm still reminded about it by folk now.

My head was bursting after the Rangers game but I was actually ok back in the dressing room, however if there was a race to get in front of the cameras after the match. Leish was the one who was going to win! He told the cameras that I'd fainted in the dressing room, which I hadn't, but that stuck and I was getting pelters from away crowds for a while after that! I did get my Mr Superfit reward eventually though. I've got the man of the match award from Avr United as well. Ally McLeod had been saying before the game that they were going to beat us in that tie. one of our lads told him afterwards that he'd told us we'd win the World Cup back in 1978 and look how that turned out...

Of all the players I've played with, I have to mention Norrie of course. Off the park as well, he'd help you with things house related and give great advice about life. All wee things at the time, but you now realise just how helpful guys like him were. Also Ross Jack, he would just talk to you all the time and encourage you along the way. When I got later in my career, I'd like to think I took on that role as well with the voungsters. If some players look back now and think of me in that Ross Jack type of role when they were younger, I'll be a happy man

We struggled to stay up that season with three teams going down, but I scored in the 6-1 win over Dundee which was a great result at the time when we'd been on a bad run of results. I got some really frustrating injuries the next season though and just couldn't get going. Missed half the games and never really got a settled run before injury would stop me again. I don't remember too much about the Meadowbank game at the end of the following season when we won the league, though I do remember driving through and feeling the suspense and anticipation around the place. The night out is even more of a blur, as I'm not a big drinker! I may have been in and out the side that season, but was still proud to have played my part and get a medal for being part of that great squad of boys.

Probably good for my health that I missed out on the summer trip to Tenerife though! I had my stag do and wedding that same summer. so couldn't make the club trip. Maria and I got married and are still happily together now. Her father had a taxi firm that we eventually took over and sold that part of the business off. We now do school contracts, so we both run children to and from school each day, but the rest of the time we have to ourselves which works out very nicely for the two of us. Plus I see the games at the weekend doing the stats mostly for Ayr United (sometimes Dumbarton) each week and phone in all the live info that you get on your

screens and phones each week, so I'm still getting my football fix each week, which I really enjoy.

When is came to moving on from Dunfermline, there were a few sides that expressed some interest. Then one day, the club told me they had accepted an offer from Nottingham Forest! It was a no brainer for me, even if I had little chance of getting into their side, they were one of the top sides in the country at that point. The English 1990 World Cup squad, which got to the semis, had a few Forest players in the starting line up. I maybe give myself a hard time. but it was a massive challenge to get into that side looking back. As well as the established pros, there were guys like Steve Stone who went onto play for England, a young Roy Keane working his way through the ranks having just signed from Ireland and others such as

Sean Dyche and Ian Woan (the current management duo at Burnley) I went to Shrewsbury after that and had a good six year spell down there, probably should have stayed longer, but my daughter was the age to start school so we came back up the road. Meghan was born down there so we might go down for a trip down memory, she's pregnant and due in May so I will be a granddad for the first time soon! Paul my son was born when came up the road and was born in Paisley.

In terms of Forest, I was only there for a short time but could mention loads of Brian Clough stories needless to say. One match, we were playing away at Coventry City's Highfield Stadium midweek in the Central League. It was so cold, it was actually sore when you were breathing! We came in for a cup of tea at half time,

Clough came in bouncing a ball and we were wondering what was going to happen next. We were all absolutely frozen and holding onto these cups of tea like they were life itself. Suddenly, Clough would throw the ball at one of the lads, who then dropped his cup of tea all over his leg and it blistered up straight away; didn't look nice at all! A bit of a rollicking and a team talk from the manager later, he had to join the rest of us running back out for the second half. Probably still has a scar to show for it to this day!

I was sorry to miss out on an invitation from Chris to come through to the recent Pars game against Hamilton, due to hospitality being off with the restrictions, but I'm looking forward to getting back through soon and I'll try and get a word in with Leish when he's telling some of his versions of events!"

In September 1960, The Pars played a friendly against Leicester City in front of an East End Park crowd of 21,472.

The Filberts with Gordon Banks in goal were leading 1-0 at half time, through their full back lan King with a penalty. King had played trials for Dunfermline before signing for Leicester. He scored another penalty in the second half but two Charlie Dickson goals, one from Harry Melrose and a John Sweeney penalty saw The Pars win the contest.

A SEASON IN TIME

1986 - 1987 Leishman's progress

Buoyed by the manner of their promotion as champions, Pars fans were confident that Jim Leishman's team would do well enough to consolidate their position in the middle league, without a nail-biting fight against relegation.

In preparation for the new season, Ian Gordon was sold to Raith Rovers and exciting newcomers Eric Ferguson from Rangers and Ian McCall from Queens Park were joined by centre half Grant Reid from Stenhousemuir and ex Dundee defender John Waddell. Jim Watters retired as chairman and was replaced by Mel Rennie with Bill Braisby stepping up to vice-chairman. The only preseason friendly was at home to Aberdeen and finished 2-2.

The season proper began on 9th August, at East End Park, with Forfar Athletic as visitors. Reid, Ferguson and McCall all made their debuts as John Watson scored to separate the sides. The first away game was at Boghead and a Mark Clougherty own goal produced another 1-0 win for The Pars. Alex Totten was the Sons manager and Bert Paton his assistant.

top of the League. The League Cup was next and brought SPL side St Mirren to East End Park, where two Frank McGarvey goals saw the Buddies into the next round. The League campaign resumed with a visit from Clyde. John Watson and lan McCall got the goals in a 2-0 win but, just when things looked rosy, East Fife served up a wake-up call by winning 4-2 at East End Park.

September arrived with a tricky trip to Kilmarnock, but The Pars had taken their warning and won 2-1 thanks to Grant Jenkins and Bobby Forrest. This was achieved despite John Waddell picking up his second booking and the inevitable red card as early as the 26th minute.

Brechin City were despatched 4-1 at Glebe Park before the visit of Partick Thistle. Grant Jenkins and an own goal by The Jags John Donnelly gave Dunfermline a 2-0 win. Queen of the South, who had been promoted alongside The Pars, had also been playing well in the higher division. The 1-1 draw at Palmerston was, therefore, a satisfactory result. Manager Leishman "rewarded" John Donnelly for his goal by signing him for Athletic and he made his debut at home to Airdrie, the only team above The Pars in the table. A crowd in the region of 6.000 saw a tough 0-0 draw.

The last game of the month was also at home, this time to Montrose and with Hugh Whyte making his first appearance since March 1985, John Watson scored the only goal.

October began with a trip to Forfar and a share of the points after a tough 3-3 draw. Westy was back for the next game, at home to Dumbarton, but after a poor display, The Sons came out on top 1-0. That graveyard of Pars hopes that is Shawfield had disappeared from the football map and Firhill was now the venue for Clvde's home games. Another 1-0 defeat for Dunfermline, kept the jinx in place. The poor form continued as Athletic were held to a 1-1 draw at home to Morton.

The final Saturday of the month saw a return to



form as Brechin City were comprehensively beaten 4-0 at East End. Gordon Connelly made his debut in this match. There was time for a midweek match before the month ended and this time Firhill was more hospitable as a John Watson goal beat Partick Thistle.

November got under way with a 1-0 home win against Kilmarnock, with John Donnelly the scorer. East Fife at Bayview was next but The Pars lost 2-1 against their fellow Fifers. Queen of the South were next to come visiting and escaped with a point after a 2-2 draw. The month finished with a trip to Links Park, where Montrose were beaten 2-0, with the goals coming from John Watson and Rowan Hamilton.

As December kicked off, John Watson and Stevie Morrison got the goals which beat Forfar at East End Park, whilst it was lan McCall and Norrie McCathie who secured a 2-1 win away to Dumbarton. Bad weather meant that the next game was after Christmas at Cappielow. Norrie McCathie and Ian McCall were The Pars scorers in a 2-2 draw.

Despite all the promises made on previous miserable, football and drink ruined, pain wracked Ne'er Davs. I turned up at East End Park to see my heroes take on East Fife. It was tailor made for disaster, so i was relatively pleased with a 1-1 draw. A few changes had taken place over the holiday. Ian Campbell had been appointed Player-Coach to assist Gregor Abel. Ian Heddle had transferred to St Johnstone and John Waddell freed. The first Saturday of the year took The Pars down to Ayrshire to meet Kilmarnock and they returned with a creditable 2-2 draw. The next two games fell victim to the heavy snow which covered the country. It was the 24th before the next fixture which was at Palmerston, where The Pars picked up their first win of the year, 2-1. The last day of January saw this season's Cup campaign begin and end at Easter Road where Hibs triumphed 2-0.

A series of home matches opened February. First Airdrie took a point in a 1-1 draw, with Billy Mackay, on loan from Hearts, making his debut from the bench. This was followed by a visit from Clyde. Eric Ferguson and John Donnelly got the goals in to win 2-0. Despite a John Donnelly own goal, Eric Ferguson and Ian McCall secured a 2-1 win. Donnelly. had scored an own goal for The Pars earlier in the season whilst in a Thistle shirt. The first away game of the month was a trip to Brechin and a 2-0 victory but on the last day of the month another trip to Angus was less productive after a 3-1 defeat at Forfar.

A winning start for March as Dunfermline saw off Montrose 2-0 at East End Park and this was followed by a visit from Dumbarton. A Steve Morrison strike was enough for a 1-0 win. The Pars away record against Clyde was woeful but this time Norrie netted a last minute winner. Typical Pars, they followed this with an unexpected home defeat from Morton. To freshen things up for the run in. Jim Leishman signed striker Willie Irvine from Hibernian. He had been a real thorn in the flesh, particularly during his time with Stirling Albion. Leaving the club was a real fans favourite - Jim Bowie who moved to St Johnstone. Ziggy, as a part-timer, had not featured for a while but everyone was sad to see him go. Irvine scored on his debut as a 1-1 draw was fought out at Bayview. With six games to go, Athletic held a two point lead over Morton andseven over third place Dumbarton. Things were looking good.

April started badly with a 1-0 defeat at home to Kilmarnock,

despite a debut for Stuart Beedie, signed from Hibs. The following Saturday, it was off to Firhill and a comfortable 2-0 win against Partick Thistle. The Pars never do anything easy and somehow contrived to lose the next match 2-0 at home to Brechin City. With two going up. Dunfermline had it in their own hands going into their home match with Queen of the South. They played well and went ahead through Willie Irvine. before holding on for a 1-0 win. The SPL beckoned for the first time

With the fans and club expectations joyously exceeded, The Pars proceeded to throw away the Championship by losing their last two games, both away from home, 2-1 at Airdrie and 1-0 at Montrose. Nevertheless, Jim Leishman's achievement had been remarkable. He had saved the club, given it back to the fans. He and Gregor Abel had the team playing exciting football and the fans had responded by turning up in numbers. The rise back to the top division had been achieved in the three years of Jim's reign.

On the playing side, Norrie McCathie had played in all 46 games and not far behind him were Ian Westwater, John Watson and Bobby Forrest. Roll on next season!

Local boy Alex Edwards made his debut for the club at just 16 years old. We look over his career in Scottish football.

Alex Edwards was born in the man that launched his another losing effort Dunfermline on the 14th of February 1946, and just five days after turning 16, made his debut for his hometown club in a league fixture against Hibernian. From that moment on, he had Pars the showcase event at fans smitten.

football at any level would be joyous at that age, and Alex's 16th became all that sweeter when he featured in the Pars' sixtwo victory over Spanish outfit Valencia in the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup. Edwards assisted the opener and the subsequent goal with crosses from the right wing. It would be the first of many European appearances for himself and the club in the 60s.

Still a teenager, Alex went on to play in the 1965 Scottish Cup Final in a three-two defeat to a out in his third Scottish Celtic side managed by

The Vice-Chairman with the Coventry FPA is a gentleman called Billy Bell, who has remained a great friend of Roy's. things, there has been little in the way of players who have appeared for both clubs. Only three and their connections are tenuous. Young Sky Blues forward Craig Faulconbridge came to The Pars on loan to get a chance of first team football. His appearances were all from the substitute's bench. In one of these he scored his only goal but what an important goal it was. On May 3rd he equaljsed at home to Celtic and this meant that The Hoops did not win the Championship at East End Park, though they did wih it a week later. Craig's goal was a cracker. The following season, his loan was extended, but he only managed one first team appearance. His Pars total was 1 + 13 sub



appearances and that one goal He returned to Coventry but never made a break through anc drifted into non-league football.

The story was very different

with Noel Whelan he had a very successful spell at Coventry after signing from Leeds United. He played around 150 games for The Sky Blues, scoring over 30 goals, before transferring to Middlesbrough. He played for a number of other clubs, including Aberdeen before ending up at Livingston in 2006.

He was brought to Dunfermline at the start of 2006/07 season but his Pars playing career lasted all of three minutes as he was injured on his debut at home to Hearts and never played for the Club again, drifting out of the game in nonleague football in the North of England.

The third was Stuart Urquhart who signed for Coventry on a three year contract from Rangers in 2013 He did not make the breakthrough with the Sky Blues and came to East End Park during season 2014/15. He made a total Of 12 starts and 2 appearances from the bench. Sadly Stuart had to retire on health grounds in 2015.

BILLY LIDDELL

He played well over 500 games and scored well in excess of 200 goals.

He grew up as a Pars fan, having been born in Townhill on 10th January 1922. His youth career was with Kingseat Juveniles and Lochgelly Violet. He signed for Liverpool in 1938 and continued with them until 1961. During the war Billy was with the RAF and this interrupted his career with The Reds. He died on 3rd July 2001 aged 79 and this year would have been his century.

In 1944, whilst stationed in Perth, Billy Liddell - Liverpool superstar - played three games for Dunfermline Athletic. He starred for his

boyhood heroes against East Fife, Aberdeen and Dundee United

SCOTTISH CUP FOURTH ROUND EAST END PARK SATURDAY 22ND FEBRUARY 1988

After convincing wins over Dunfermline in the League **Cup and the Premier Division** this was Rangers third match at East End Park in the 1987-89 season. Dunfermline's 2-0 win in the Scottish Cup second round replay against Second Division Ayr United on 3rd February, was their only win in their last eleven games.

Scottish Cup for the first time and the achievement of Jim Leishman's team was all the more remarkable since it came at at a time when the lbrox team was full of high profile international players. This included Richard Gough signed from Tottenham Hotspur for a club record fee of £1.5m.

31 year old keeper Dave McKellar, was playing just his Nevertheless the Pars second game for Dunfermline would defeat Rangers in the since signing from Hamilton Accies in January. The previous season he had been in goals at Ibrox when his former club's 1-0 win had knocked Rangers out of the Scottish Cup. That trophy would elude Graeme Souness throughout his time in charge of Rangers.

It was the team second bottom of the SPL against second top as Dunfermline kicked off attacking the goal at the town end but it wasn't long before the Gers created

danger. Davie Cooper made a good early run up the left punctuated by a fine pass towards lan Durrant in the left side of the Fifers box but thankfully John Holt made a great interception.

The latecomer Rangers fans were still being escorted along the trackside when a slick pass from Craig Robertson sent Mark SMITH up the right wing and the despite efforts of Danish internationalist Jan Bartram to stop the cross, the crossed ball sailed into top left corner with just a horror filled wave from Chris Woods as he failed to keep it out. Only the fifth minute and the 23 year old who had been signed from Celtic in 1987, had given the Pars the lead. 1-0

Rangers responded from a

Cooper free kick from 25 yards out. The effort rebounded back off the defensive wall and Graham Roberts powered in a good low shot that



did well to take. The Pars were tested when a Mark Walters cross was headed back across goal by Gough only for Durrant to head over the

crossbar at the left post. Norrie McCathie then kept out Durrant, conceding a corner that Cooper sent over from the left. Gough's header was deflected away from Walters by Holt only for Durrant to get a chance at the left post that the Pars kept out.

A short pass back by Gough then put Woods in trouble as Mark Smith's pace 25 yards threatened to get him around the keeper but in tumbling the Pars winger the English internationalist's challenge was deemed to have been deliberate. A yellow card was shown to the keeper and centre back Roberts for dissent. From the resultant free kick Bobby Smith could only win a corner.

Rangers pushed for an equaliser before half time but there was to be yet more drama,

and again it involved Mark Smith. Robertson was able to win possession just inside his own half. His pass to Bobby Smith was moved on for Stuart Beedie to drill the ball into the Rangers half. Mark Smith was chasing on to take advantage when out off the ball he was taken out by John Brown.

The home fans were chanting 'off' as the referee consulted his linesman and the conclusion was to show Brown red. The enraged 26 year old had to be restrained by Ray Wilkins but Rangers were down to ten men.

The first half had been all about Mark Smith, apart from his goal he was at the heart of everything that caused Rangers problems.

Before the restart Scott Nisbet came on for Davie Cooper but again it was the

home side that took the early initiative. Ross Jack evaded the offside trap and Woods had to parry away a well struck shot.

In the third minute of the second half Dunfermline increased their lead from a Beedie corner. As the ball came in from the left, inevitably it was Mark Smith who flicked the ball on for John WATSON to meet with a perfectly timed diving header. 2-0

There was plenty of time left for the ten man Rangers to react but Dunfermline pulled out all their defensive qualities to keep them out. McCathie made an important block after McKellar could not hold at Durrant feet. Gough was pushed upfront with Watson tracking back to mark him. When Bartram delivered a dangerous ball into the box seeking Gough, Watson

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defended well intervening in front of McKellar.

There was fear in the home ranks when Trevor Francis was introduced to the cup tie with 20 minutes remaining but he would not be the trump card they required and the closest Rangers came was a Nisbet header that slipped over the crossbar.

The match ended with the Fifers on the offensive and it was Dunfermline's first victory over Rangers since 27th April 1972, a victory that saw them through to meet Hearts at Tynecastle in the last eight.

Mark Smith had been involved in everything that was significant to the game and it was no surprise that he was awarded the Superfit Man of the Match Award.





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
